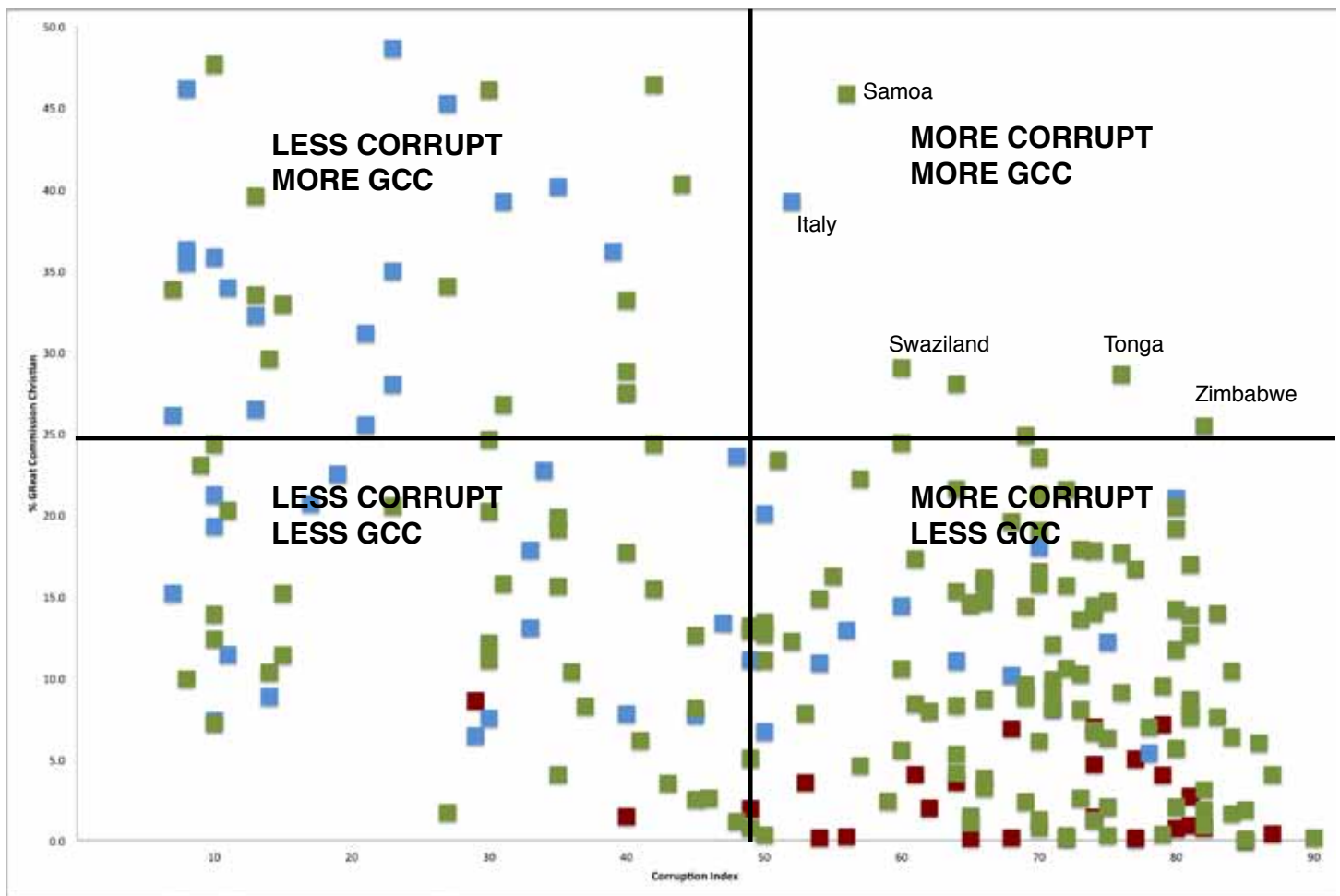


## Global Diagram 2: Great Commission Christians concerned to obey Christ, and National Corruption Levels

Vertical Axis: % Great Commission Christian: believers who take seriously Christ's commands, seek to obey, and to influence others to do the same. Similar but not exactly same as Evangelical. *Atlas of Global Christianity*, 2010.

Horizontal Axis: index of corruption for each country, from 0 to 100, as of 2010 (*Atlas of Global Christianity*), based mostly on data from Transparency International.

Colors of dots: 100-year GCC growth rate.  
 Red: GCC growth < population growth rate  
 Blue: GCC growth > population, < 2% p.a.  
 Green: GCC growth > population, > 2% (over replacement value and growing in influence)

In this diagram, we chart % **Great Commission Christian**—an estimate of the percentage of a population who take seriously Christ's call to follow him in his mission on Earth, and who are in some degree attempting to obey this call and to influence others to obey it as well—against the Corruption Index. There is a clear correlation between rising levels of % GCC and falling levels of corruption: the more people seeking to obey Christ, the lower the levels of corruption. Moreover, countries where % GCC is growing slower than Christianity are clustered at the highest levels of corruption (note the light-red boxes at lower right). Since % GCC is one of the fastest growing elements of Christianity in the world, we are not surprised to see fast-growing segments scattered throughout, although there is a clear "slowing" further from the more "corrupt" regions—correlating with larger GCC communities where growth naturally slows. Notably, unlike % Christian (Global Diagram 1), there are very few countries in the *more corrupt, more GCC* category. **Diagram Editor:** Justin D. Long.
